# **Trafficking Examples**

- Hector is a 17 yo male from a small village near Villa Nueva. His
  parents wish to get him out of Guatemala due to violence. His mother
  works with an employment agency to get him a job in Akron, in
  construction.
- Louisa is a 10-year-old female whose mother lost her job during COVID. The family is now facing eviction. The mother tells Louisa to 'go with the landlord and do whatever he wants..."
- Sophia is a 14 yo female who has a boyfriend in a gang. She is made to sell sex at a local motel as part of her affiliation with the gang.







#### Do Trafficked Persons Seek Medical Care?


- » 82.5% seen at the local children's hospital within past year <sup>1</sup>
- » 42.9% had received health care within the 2 months prior to identification<sup>2</sup>
- » Persons seek care in variety of settings<sup>3</sup>
  - 63% Hospital/ED
  - 57% any type of clinic
  - 30% Planned Parenthood
  - 23% Regular doctor







# Possible Indicators of Trafficking


- Consider adverse health effects of trafficking....
  - →Work-related injuries
  - **→**Malnutrition
  - →Multiple STI's
  - →Pregnancies, abortions, or miscarriages
  - ✦Illicit drug use
  - **+**Current or past history of:
    - Sexual assault
    - Inflicted Injury
- Visible signs of physical abuse



## **Screening for Human Trafficking**

Using Trauma-Informed, Rights-Based Approach

# Keep Your Goals in Mind....



#### Adolescents: 6-Item Screen

- 1.Drug/alcohol use in past 12 months
- 2. History running away
- 3. History with police
- 4. History broken bones, knocked unconscious, cuts needing stitches
- 5. History STI
- 6. Number of sex partners (>5 is 'Yes')

≥ 2 Yes answers = positive screen


# Follow-Up After Screen

- Follow up on positive answers from screen (open-ended questions)
- 2) Have you ever been in a position where you've had to consider exchanging sex for something you wanted or needed (money, food, shelter or other items)?
- 3) Has anyone ever asked you to have sex with another person?

#### **Universal Education and Resources**

- Talk about
  - Healthy relationships
  - Impact of violence on health
  - Harm reduction techniques
  - Human trafficking

 Community resources, national resources



#### **Conclusions**

- Working with trafficked minors presents challenges related to developmental factors and status of children/adolescents in society
- Screening for risk may be helpful in the health setting
- Universal education with resources also beneficial
